PE and sport premium

The PE and sport premium is paid to LAs and distributed to maintained primary schools within their jurisdiction. Academies and free schools receive the funding directly from the ESFA.

Maintained schools, academies and free schools must publish information about their use of the premium on their website by 31 July each year. This information should include the following:

- The amount of premium received
- A full breakdown of spending or how the funding will be spent
- The impact on pupils' PE and sport participation and attainment
- How the improvements will be sustained over coming years
- What percentage of pupils within a school's Year 6 cohort are meeting the national curriculum requirement to swim competently, confidently and proficiently over a distance of at least 25 metres, use a range of strokes effectively, and perform safe self-rescue in different water-based situations

If selected, schools must also take part in a sampling review to scrutinise their compliance with the conditions.

The following tables contain fields and prompts that allow you to easily complete your reporting requirements. Examples have been included in some areas to get you started.

In addition, we have included a <u>PE and sport premium action plan</u> for the following academic year. This can be used to help plan your spending and ensure continued success.

Funding rate: The funding rate for 2022/3 is as follows: for schools with 17 or more pupils, £16,000 plus £10 per pupils. For schools with 16 or fewer pupils, £1,000 per pupil.		
Given the need to make sustainable improvements, the government acknowledged that during the pandemic recovery, it was difficult for schools to spend their funding appropriately. During this time, the department made an exception to allow schools to carry unspent funding between academic years. Given the continued effect that managing recovery has had on schools, the government have decided to extend		

this exception (to allow schools to carry unspent funding between academic years) for the 2022 to 2023 grant into the 2023 to 2024 academic year. Hartwell Primary School will carry forward £4,124 into the next academic year.
